Course Description

A chronological examination of art and architecture in relation to significant historical and cultural events from Pre-History to about 1300 C.E.

Prerequisites &/or Co-requisites

Objectives of the Course

By the end of this course, the students will be expected to be able to

Recognize and name works of art which define the major Western traditions including specific terminology and characteristics.

Identify and describe the compositional elements of art.

Explain historical aspects and significances of works of art.

Compare and contrast differences and similarities of works of art, and across traditions and cultures.

Analyze and discuss works of art to start a dialogue with other perspectives.

Evaluate and critique works of art according to their own personal interpretation.

<u>TESTS</u> will include the identification of works of art, multiple-choice questions, true-and-false questions, fill-in-the-blanks question, as well as short descriptions, commentaries, comparisons and interpretations of works of art.

No use of the internet, electronic devices, textbooks or notes is permitted in the tests.

It is your responsibility to come to the tests. If you miss a test, please approach the instructor as soon as possible to set up a re-write test date. Missed re-write tests CANNOT be re-scheduled. Also please note that TEST 4 CANNOT be re-taken.

<u>WRITTEN ASSIGNMENTS</u> will include descriptions, commentaries, comparisons and interpretations of works of art. These will be practiced in small group discussions in class. Written assignments are expected to be a minimum of ONE PAGE of printed text [double-spaced, font size 12] in ESSAY FORMAT [introduction, arguments/aspects/elements, conclusion], with no research or references necessary.

Note: It is the student's responsibility to keep a copy of or any relevant documentation regarding each submitted assignment.

Please hand in your assignments directly to your instructor. If this is not possible, you can use the drop box outside of AB 608. Assignments that are put into the drop box will be date-stamped and placed in the instructor's mailbox.

If you are having trouble with tests or written assignments, it is strongly recommended that you come and see your instructor, to help you to change or improve your learning strategies.

Grades will <u>not</u> be posted on D2L; students need to pick up their graded tests and assignments in class or from the instructor's office.

Students are not required to attain a passing grade in each of the individual tests and assignments in order to have a final passing grade for the course, provided they achieve a cumulative grade of 50% of higher for the course.

Late assignment policy:

Late assignments will result in a lower grade for each day late; e.g., B+ grade assignment which

was 2 days late will be reduced to B-.

Writing in tests and assignments:

Correct spelling of the names, locations, materials, etc., of works of art is expected, and numerous incorrect spelling will result in a lower grade.

Although class attendance is not mandatory, it will be difficult - if not impossible - to do well academically if too many classes are missed because you will be tested on information from the lecture presentations and in-class discussions [as well as from the textbook]. Careful note-taking is necessary. It is your responsibility to come to class and take notes. Students are much more likely to retain information through active learning - when you sit passively listening, information often goes in one ear and out the other. By contrast, if you have to engage with it, decide whether it is important, note it down, you are more likely to be able to retain it later. Note-taking is an important skill, one that will serve you well in other courses and later in life. If you are not in class, you cannot improve your skills.

A schedule with lecture topics will be posted on D2L. Please note that unforeseen circumstances may cause changes to the schedule with respect to the timing of topics. Students will be notified of changes on D2L and in class. The dates of tests and due dates of written assignments are firm and will not be altered.
