An examination of art and architecture after 1400 in relation to significant historical and cultural events.

Objectives of the Course

By the end of this course, learners should be able to:

- recognize and analyze themes of art and architecture across the major European traditions covered in this course [1400-1750];
- identify significant works from the covered traditions, and argue for and/or explain this significance;
- develop a personal opinion by reflecting on images, and by discussing pertinent questions and issues;
- identify and structure thematic connections between works of art and/or architecture within a conceptual context.

Suggested Textbook:

Fred S. Kleiner: Art Through the Ages: A Global History, volume 2, 16th edition.

Earlier editions are acceptable, but please be aware that some works might not be included.

Assignments and Evaluation

QUESTIONNAIRE

worth 5% of final grade due Monday, 29 June 2020, 11:30pm.

This assignment is intended to foster general thoughts on art and expectations for this course. Please answer the questions of the posted QUESTIONNAIRE [D2L content: week 1] and submit in digital form [saved only as word or pdf file] to the appropriate D2L drop-box.

The grade for this assignment is predicated by answering <u>all</u> questions based on your personal opinion explained comprehensively and as best as you can.

D2L GROUP DISCUSSION PARTICIPATION

worth 25% of final grade

1 thread & 3 replies due each week [week 2-6]

The D2L discussion tool is used for students to develop a personal opinion by reflecting on the course material, particular works, as well as pertinent questions and issues relating to the course framework [Europe 1400-1750]. In small groups, students will be able to train the articulation of their opinions, to come across and respect other perspectives, and to respond and argue for or against certain interpretations. The discussions will also foster new social connections – making new friends!

In every weekly module [week 2-6] various questions or issues will be presented for students to choose from; at least <u>one thread</u> has to be started as a response to one question/issue; at least <u>3 replies</u> have to be posted as comments on other group members' posts. You have to post your answer and comments during the week the questions are posted to count towards your discussion-participation grade. Each post should be at least 6 complete sentences or 10 full lines long.

AESTHETIC RESPONSE

worth 15% of final grade due Monday, 13 July 2020, 11:30pm.

This assignment is intended to practice reflection and to help you develop a personal opinion about the effects, impacts and subjective relevance of works and visual experience in general. You will be presented with various images and multiple WORDS relating to these images; you are expected to select honestly and authentically the 3 words which YOU personally think best describe the impact, meaning and YOUR experience of the presented images. You will also be presented with questions about effects and the relevance of these images <u>for you</u>; please answer them by providing comprehensive and detailed explanations.

LEARNING LOG

worth 35% of final grade

due Monday, 20 July 2020, 11:30pm; for a preliminary grade & feedback [covering week 2 & 3] due Wednesday, 12 August 2020, 11:30pm; covering entire course material [week 2-7]

This assignment is intended for learners to become aware of the continuities and the differences, the innovations and resulting changes of themes and concerns of art and architecture across the different cultures and traditions covered in this course [Europe 1400-1750].

Please work through the posted course material [texts, visual presentations and video links] and **summarize** the individual topics [list of topics is posted on D2L: content – assignments – learning log] **by selecting at least 5 major themes** [list of possible themes -which is not exhaustive- is posted on D2L: content – assignments – learning log].

For each topic, name <u>one work</u> which YOU consider the <u>most significant</u> and **argue for and/or explain this significance** by alluding to its specific or general cultural context, and/or the bigger picture of the tradition or period, and/or by connecting the selected work to our own time with regards to relevance, and/or by associating the selected work to your personal experience. Try to be as precise and detailed as possible, by specifying aspects or details [e.g. of design or composition] you see in the selected work.

Please submit your learning log [week 2-3] for feedback and a preliminary grade by Monday, 20 July 2020, 11:30pm, to the appropriate drop-box in digital form [saved only as word or pdf file]. Please submit your <u>final learning log</u> [week 2-7] for one grade for this assignment by Wednesday, 12 August 2020, 11:30pm, to the appropriate drop-box in digital form [saved only as word or pdf file]. Please note that <u>no extensions</u> for the final learning log will be granted because we are at the end of the term.

CONCEPT-MAP

worth 15% of final grade due Wednesday, 5 August 2020, 11:30pm.

This assignment is intended to foster the identification and analysis of themes and of connections between works in order to create a system of conceptual relations.

Please select 5 themes from your learning log that you regard as most important reflecting your understanding of this course [from the material covered so far] and connect them to 10 works pertaining to the framework of this course [Europe 1400-1750, but not necessarily covered in the course material] and search 5 additional works not covered in this class [from any culture, any time-period, anywhere in the world, could be from our global contemporary visual culture, e.g. social media, movies, etc.] which relate to your 5 themes.

A list with possible themes of art and architecture is posted on D2L [content – assignments – concept map], including wealth, monumentality, harmony, tension, spirituality, beauty, individuality, to name but a few; this is not an exhaustive list, please use any other relevant theme[s] you can identify that summarize important aspects of this course [= personal, subjective choice].

Please provide all works as images with their titles, names of artists and locations [for architecture]. Submit your concept map in digital form [saved only as pdf file] to the appropriate D2L drop-box. Examples of concept maps will be provided on D2L [content – assignments – concept map].

The grade for this assignment will be predicated by:

- correct format [5 themes, 10 works from course framework & 5 additional examples, as images]
- direct connections between themes and works [lines, arrows, symbols,...];
- visual appeal of your creatively and/or logically structured presentations [e.g. color].

FINAL REFLECTION ASSIGNMENT

worth 5% of final grade due Friday, 14 August 2020, 11pm.

This assignment is intended to train your awareness and reflection on the content, your learning and the assignments of this course.

Students are not required to attain a passing grade in each of the individual assignments in order to have a final passing grade for the course, provided they achieve a cumulative grade of 50% or higher for the course.
