Course Description

Forms and concepts in Canadian art from 1900 to the present; the Group of Seven, Nationalism, Regionalism and more recent developments in Canadian art.

Prerequisites

Art History 201 and 203.

Objectives of the Course

Students who successfully complete this course will:

- 1. demonstrate understanding of the production, circulation, and exhibition of art and cultural objects in a consideration of Canada after 1900;
- 2. contextualize art and cultural objects as they relate to the social, political, economic, and cultural circumstances of twentieth- and twenty-first century Canada;
- 3. develop and defend evaluations of art and cultural objects of post-1900 Canada using informed experiential and theoretical knowledge
- 4. undertake critical evaluations of modern and contemporary Canadian art and cultural objects in relation to the construction and maintenance of historically specific categories, such as gender, race, class, and nation;
- 5. articulate assessments of art and cultural objects produced in the territory of Canada after 1900 in both written and verbal discussions;
- 6. and understand the contingency of creating history and knowledge, and be open to critical selfreflection.

Textbooks and Readings

The readings are in a textbook and course pack, both of which are required for the course and can be purchased at the University of Calgary bookstore.

5 responses in total are required. You must submit responses at the beginning of the class in which the readings are being discussed. There will be no exceptions. You are responsible for submission dates and length requirements, and exceptions cannot be made after submission dates have passed.
