Course Description

The University of Calgary Course Calendar Description: Two-dimensional activities and the structural, organizational, perceptual, social and psychological aspects of art.

Prerequisites &/or Co-requisites

None.

Objectives of the Course

This course will introduce students to the vocabulary, contexts, methods and materials of the twodimensional picture plane through assigned projects, illustrated lectures, and group discussions. Upon successful completion of the course students will demonstrate:

- 1. ability to engage in sustained study of two-dimensional art theory and practice;
- 2. basic visual literacy and critical thinking skills relative to the compositional, cultural, and psychological content of art;
- 3. application of fundamental structural and organizational methods and concepts of two-dimensional art;
- 4. management of personal creative practice and participation as an active learner in course activities.

Textbooks and Readings

Readings and research topics will be assigned throughout the course.

Assignments and Evaluation

A grading rubric will be provided for weekly assignments and posted on D2L. Grades will be distributed over 13 weekly assignment units.

Late Assignment Policy

Late assignments: Submit by the beginning of class the following week.

If a student misses the submission deadline for an assignment or homework he or she must complete the assignment and submit it no later than the beginning of class the week following the original deadline. If the one-week extension is not met, the student will receive zero for the assignment.

Missed in-class activities: Submit Missed Activity Worksheet by the following week.

If a student misses all or a significant portion of in-class activities, (because he or she is late, absent, or comes to class unprepared for the activity), he or she must complete a Missed Activity Worksheet and submit it no later than the beginning of the class the week following. The instructor will determine if the student has missed a significant amount of in-class activity. If the one-week extension is not met, the student will receive a zero for the activity. It is the student's responsibility to contact the instructor by email to receive the worksheet.

Missed both activities and assignments: Submit assignment & worksheet by posted deadline.

If a student is sick and misses both in-class activities and assignments, he or she must complete the assignment and the Missed Activity Worksheet and submit by the deadline.

Students who have mitigating circumstances, such as missing more than one class in a row, and cannot submit late assignments within the one-week extension period must contact the instructor in writing to receive notice of their options, which may include the need for a special Deferral of Term Work. As outlined in the University Calendar, the instructor may or may not approve the deferral and has the right to assign additional make up assignments as part of the special deferral.

NOTE: All final assignments for this course are scheduled for completion by Dec. 4. Should an extension of time be sought for completion of final assignments after the end of lectures, a Deferral of Term Work form must be completed. Additional Information (Materials for this course)

Course Activities

Course activities will be organized into weekly Lecture-Lab-Homework assignment units. Activities will pertain to the investigation of perceptual, structural, and organizational aspects of two-dimensional art composition. Skill development, material usage, and inquiry into the nature of the two-dimensional picture plane will be explored thematically (i.e., point to line, contrast, figure/ground, visual texture, symmetry, overlap, pattern, and perspectives). Students will also engage in ongoing analysis of lecture materials, readings, research assignments, and critical discussions that focus on the social, psychological, and cultural relevance of contemporary and historic art. The course will challenge students to expand ideas and expectations about art through small and large group discussions and exercises.

<u>Lecture days (Tuesdays)</u> will involve assignment reviews, lectures, group critical discussions, and presentations of course content. Assignments will be accompanied by a grading rubric that will be posted on D2L.

Lab days (Thursdays) will involve research, individual student-instructor consultations, and group studio activities.

<u>Homework (approx 3 hrs/week)</u> will prepare students for weekly class activities and projects. Homework also includes keeping up to date on all D2L announcements and preparing to come to class with appropriate materials and research.
