# **Course Description**

As posted in the University of Calgary calendar: Two-dimensional activities and the structural, organizational, perceptual, social and psychological aspects of art.

## **Objectives of the Course**

Upon successful completion of this course students will demonstrate:

- 1. an introductory understanding and application of formal elements and principles of the two- dimensional picture plane
- 2. basics of visual literacy (develop visual art vocabulary for analysis of art works; express critical thinking by appropriate use of concepts and terminology related to specific art media)
- 3. ability to work cooperatively and constructively in a studio environment by effectively managing time and skills necessary to create finished works of art
- 4. ability to research and identify issues of relevance in works of historic and contemporary art
- 5. increased academic confidence by participating as an active learner in group activities
- 6. increased learning capacity through artistic research
- 7. exhibit maturity by taking responsibility for learning practice while being respectful of others

## **Textbooks and Readings**

Readings as assigned.

Students will need access to the hardware and software required to do basic photo editing.

# **Assignments and Evaluation**

## All students must submit all assignments in order to pass the course.
