Course Description

Objectives of the Course

Upon successful completion of this course students will demonstrate:

- 1. an introductory understanding and application of formal elements and principles of the twodimensional picture plane.
- 2. basics of visual literacy (develop visual art vocabulary for analysis of art works; express critical thinking by appropriate use of concepts and terminology related to specific art media).
- 3. an ability to work cooperatively and constructively in a studio environment by effectively managing time and skills necessary to create finished works of art.
- 4. an ability to research and identify issues of relevance in works of historic and contemporary art
- 5. increased academic confidence by participating as an active learner in group activities.
- 6. increased learning capacity through artistic research.
- 7. exhibit maturity by taking responsibility for learning practice while being respectful of others.

Assignments and Evaluation

All students must submit all assignments in order to pass the course. Due dates are final unless otherwise negotiated with the instructor. Late assignments will receive a grade penalty of 5% per day of lateness. NO WORK WILL BE ACCEPTED, WITHOUT PRIOR ARRANGEMENT, AFTER THE LAST DAY OF CLASSES IN THE FINAL DUE DATE (i.e., DECEMBER 9, 2016).
