Course description:	Foundation course in two-dimensional art making. Creative exploration of pictorial space, composition and design will occur via learning fundamentals of perspective, colour, shape, balance and unity. Approaches may include wet and dry media, digital technologies, collage. These will be addressed in the context of research, problem solving, visual fluency and conceptual development.
Prerequisites and/or co- requisites:	None
Course Objectives:	<ul> <li>This course will examine relevant concepts and processes of two-dimensional design from an historic and contemporary perspective. Students are expected to develop and strengthen their perceptual and representational skills, visual fluency and conceptual expression.</li> <li>Upon successful completion of this course students will: <ol> <li>Experiment and demonstrate competencies with a range of two-dimensional media including, but not limited to: drawing, collage, painting, printmaking, digital media and photography, etc.</li> <li>Demonstrate a general understanding of principles of two-dimensional design through participation in all course activities and completion of all assignments.</li> <li>Demonstrate capacities to develop unique works through various creative approaches: techniques, problem-solving strategies, experimentation and research/investigative skills.</li> </ol> </li> </ul>
Required Textbooks or Readings:	A textbook is not required for this course. There will be required readings and supplemental course support materials as assigned in class.
Course Schedule:	<ul> <li>There is no final examination in this course.</li> <li>Marks are based on term work and class participation.</li> <li>Term marks will be accessed via two portfolio submissions, one Midterm portfolio submission and one Final portfolio submission.</li> <li>There will be four Projects over the course of the term.</li> <li>All drawings from the beginning of term, plus the first two Project assignments, will be due at Midterm. The remaining term drawings, plus the final two Project assignments, will be due at the end of the course, for Final assessment.</li> </ul>

Week One: introduction to drawing, value scales, perspective theory and exercises
Week Two: dry media, documentation, light source theory, geometric shapes, value
Veek Three: theory & principles of 2D, composition, categories of light
Week Four: introduction to colour theory (part 1), colour media (dry & wet)
Veek Five: diagonal line, volume, negative space
Week Six: continuation of colour theory (part 2), Midterm critique (portfolio due)
Week Seven: introduction to acrylics, theory exercises
Veek Eight: image manipulation, expressive line, texture
Veek Nine: mixed media construction, bricolage, realism & distortion
Week Ten: photography & manipulation, photo montage
Week Eleven: Term break, no classes
Week Twelve: abstraction, design composition
Neek Thirteen: transparency, white on white
Neek Fourteen: Final Critique (portfolio due)

Information:	All students are required to complete an online safety quiz. Upon completion, this quiz must be forwarded to the instructor.

	Initial supplies needed for the first class, Tuesday, January 09 are:

	You will be expected to purchase the necessary materials for your assignments and projects. The total cost for your materials will depend on your ideas.
	<b>Course Activities</b> Course activities will include lectures, demonstrations, group discussions and creative practice which may involve drawing, painting, collage/assemblage, setting up some still-life situations; to name a few.
	<b>Critiques:</b> There will be two important Critique days during the term: midterm and final. It is highly recommended that the student prepares for critiques by recording his/her thoughts in their sketchbook prior to each critique.
