Course Description

Foundation course in three-dimensional art making. Creative exploration may include media such as plaster, clay, wood, and found objects. Technical approaches may include mold-making, casting, additive and subtractive processes. Form, mass, volume and materials will be addressed in the context of research, problem solving, visual fluency and conceptual development.

Objectives of the Course

This introductory course will provide the student with an opportunity to explore the range of materials, processes, and ideas related to art & design, primarily in three dimensions. While it is a studio–based course, there will also be opportunities to engage in viewing and responding to art works, architecture, advertising and consumer objects.

Students will also explore some aspects of art history and criticism so as to become more knowledgeable about the importance of 3D design (in art and in everyday life) and to develop personal design and fabrication skills.

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, the student will have gained an understanding of:

- 1. 3D art & design vocabulary and concepts;
- 2. The growth of skills in the handling of art-making tools and materials;
- 3. An understanding of sculptural processes;
- 4. An appreciation for the role of art and 3D design in society;
- 5. An appreciation for the evolution of sculpture, from pre-history to the present.

Textbooks and Readings

You are not required to purchase a textbook. Selected videos, podcasts and readings will be assigned throughout the term. You can find links to them on D2L and at http://www.functionalstone.com/233/index.htm

ASSIGNMENTS and EVALUATION

Marks are based on term work and class participation. Six studio projects will be assigned, each worth 15% of the final mark. Participation is worth 10%.

6 Project Grades will depend on the following:

- 1. Evidence within the work of an understanding about the principles of composition, which accounts for 10% (per project) and a grand total of 60% of the final grade in this course.
- 2. Evidence within the work that the tools and techniques were used correctly and that the student has paid attention to details, which accounts for 5% (per project) and a grand total of 30% of the final grade in this course.

A Participation Grade will depend on the following:

- 1. The student's level of commitment to the course, as evidenced by meeting incremental milestones and assignment due dates is worth 5% of the final grade.
- 2. The student's level of engagement with the instructor and other students by contributing comments and questions during discussions and critiques is worth 5% of the final grade.

Projects may be reworked and then re-submitted for a better mark, provided the work is handed in before Dec 9, 2020. Final grades should be tabulated and posted by Dec 23, 2020.

To pass this course, all projects and participation must be completed.

A passing grade is NOT required for each and every project to pass this course.

Writing

Writing is not a factor in the evaluation of the student's work.

Please hand in your assignments directly to your instructor. We will discuss the breakdown of each project into "milestones" that must be met as the course unfolds so as to encourage student engagement and continual progress throughout the semester.

Late Assignment Policy

All projects must be completed and submitted for marking by the dates listed above. If a component of the course is missed, the student must make arrangements to complete the work within the timeframe of the current semester.

Late assignments, without a doctor's note, will be reduced by half of one full grade per day (for any assignment, an A- becomes a B+ after 24 hours; a B+ becomes a B after 48 hours, and so on).

Additional Information

Materials

You will be expected to purchase the necessary materials for your projects. The Woodshop carries a supply of plaster, clay, plywood, Styrofoam, lumber and many other items. You will also find building materials at most hardware stores, such as Lowe's and Home Depot.

Cost: The total cost for your materials will depend on your ideas, but should be no more than the cost of a textbook for most other courses. Cost savings may be realized by sharing materials with your classmates (e.g., splitting a bag of plaster) and by recycling used items. We might be able to purchase some materials in bulk at a discounted rate (to be discussed). Some costs (especially for the Found Object Project) can be reduced by collecting materials and objects from around the home and from family and friends.

Tools

You will have access to the Art Department's Woodshop and Metal Shop, both of which have an assortment of machines and tools. Nevertheless, it would be wise to purchase a basic set of tools (extremely useful, at home or in the studio).

The recommended items are:

Three hog-hair or nylon paint brushes, filbert-shaped with long handles (sizes #2, #4, #8), a palette knife, a mixing palette (the lid from an ice cream pail works well), containers for water (yogurt containers will suffice), a straight edge, an Exacto knife with several #11 replacement blades, a utility knife with retractable snap–off blades, scissors, clean rags or paper towels, a bar of hand soap, several pencils of different hardness (4B, HB, 4H), a kneadable gum eraser, a bottle of white glue, a small hot glue gun with glue sticks, a role of painter's masking tape, a hammer, pliers, a tape measure, a screw driver with interchangeable bits and several sheets of sandpaper in various grits such as 50, 100, 150 (or 80, 120, 200), a sanding block (a hand–sized block of wood works fine), a small tool box in which to store all of your tools.

Cost: The above items may be purchased at a dollar store or a hardware store — Lowe's, Walmart, Canadian Tire, Home Depot, RONA — and should cost no more than \$180.

Course Activities

Activities will include lectures, demonstrations, group discussion and studio practice. Studio activities may involve drawing, painting, collage/assemblage, carving, sculpturing, hand-building and working with small power tools.
