#### **Course Description**

An introductory course in current photographic methods, including digital photography, digital image processing, film photography, film developing and printing and the presentation of photographs in both digital and paper-based media.

#### Antirequisite(s):

Not open to students with 300-level credit or above in photography. Credit for only one of <u>Art 235</u>, <u>335</u> or <u>336</u> will be permitted.

#### **Objectives of the Course**

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be familiar with the rudiments of Digital photography and will have developed the technical skills necessary to produce quality photographic images. In addition, the student will have some understanding of the expressive potential of the photographic medium.

#### **Textbooks and Readings**

The required texts for this course are on the course section of the D2L portal.

#### **Assignments and Evaluation**

There is no final examination in this course. Marks are based on term work. Completion of all assignments and projects is a minimum requirement for a passing grade in this course. Final grades will be calculated as follows:

- 1. Contemporary relevance of concepts
- 2. Originality of ideas and approach to ideas
- 3. Research process and exploration of ideas
- 4. Clarity of the capacity to articulate concepts/ideas

Technical Issues:

1. Composition, lighting, focus etc.
