Course Description

Basic theory and practice of drawing, involving mainly still life and figure projects in monochromatic media.

Prerequisites &/or Co-requisites

Objectives of the Course

Upon satisfactory completion of the course:

- The student will have been introduced to and will have demonstrated a general understanding of various foundational concepts relevant to drawing as a historic and contemporary artistic practice, including but not limited to: line, shape, value, form, scale, texture, gesture, composition, movement, pictorial space, perspective, still life, figure drawing, landscape and alternative approaches.
- The student will have been exposed to the work and processes of various artists relevant to drawing from a historic and contemporary perspective, inclusive of artists and approaches marginalized by the dominant artistic canon.
- The student will have experimented and will have demonstrated competency with a range of media including but not limited to: charcoal, graphite, conté, pen, ink, mixed-media and non-traditional materials.
- The student will have experimented and demonstrated competency with the use of a range of material supports, including but not limited to: newsprint, mayfair, maidstone, fabriano, canson, duralar, rag papers, a sketchbook and non-traditional supports such as found materials.
- The student will have experimented and demonstrated competency with a range of traditional and non-traditional techniques relevant to drawing as a historic and contemporary

practice, including but not limited to: observational drawing techniques, contour line, cross-hatching, shading, blind drawing, creating pictorial space, one-point and two-point empirical perspective, tromp l'oeil and abstraction.

- The student will have experimented and demonstrated competency in the use of various methodologies for drawing from a historic and contemporary perspective. Such methodologies include, but are not limited to, drawing from: observation, still life, live model, landscape, imagination, collage, maquette, photography, narrative and text.
- The student will have been exposed to and will demonstrate (through their work, discussion and research) a *consideration* of drawing as an interdisciplinary and expanded practice, inclusive of: drawing as a conceptual response, drawing and installation, drawing and sculpture, drawing and performance, drawing and collaboration, zines and hand-made artist books, drawing through animation and drawing through video.
- The student will have been exposed to and will have demonstrated a basic vocabulary for understanding and communicating concepts and methodologies relevant to drawing through course activities, small group and large group discussion and critiques.
- 9 The student will have demonstrated critical skills by articulating connections and possible interpretations of and between various concepts, techniques and methods in relationship to artistic objectives during class discussions, critiques and course activities.
- 10 The student will have demonstrated critical self-reflection skills by conducting a thorough analysis of past course work and processes in order to present a thoughtful identification of strengths in drawing and areas of improvement. The student will identify specific goals for future creative and critical work in self-reflection assignments.
- 11 Student will have demonstrated adherence to following course expectations:
 - You are expected to help and be involved in creating a classroom atmosphere of safety, mutual participation, respect, criticality, discovery and diligent work.
 - You are expected to challenge yourself, your habits and your presumptions about art and art practice.
 - You are expected to work independently and with other students. You will be given the opportunity to do both in this class.
 - You are expected to take creative risks and be willing to engage the challenges implicit in various course assignments and activities.
 - You are expected to experiment with materials, ideas, approaches, themes and modes of presentation in your artwork produced in this class.

Textbooks and Readings

Supplemental course reading will be provided on an as-needed basis at no cost to the student .

Evaluation Breakdown:

Classroom Community and Professionalism:

Students are expected to attend all classes. A mark will be given for each student each class dependent upon their contribution to the class community and demonstrated level of professionalism. This grade will be affected by: being absent from class, arriving late to class, arriving unprepared for class activities (i.e., not bringing necessary supplies), failure to participate in class activities, using personal technologies during designated technology-free times (see below).

In the event that a serious illness or extenuating circumstances prompts a student to miss a significant number of classes, the student is advised to contact their instructor immediately. Upon instructor consultation, the student may be advised to apply for a formal accommodation with approval from a physician or recognized health professional.

Artwork Portfolio and Self Reflection (Evaluation of Course Assignments):

All in-class assignments will be due at the end of every class unless indicated otherwise by your instructor. Homework assignments will be due on the due date indicated on the individual assignment outline for critique.

All assignments will be re-reviewed and evaluated by your instructor upon receiving your **Artwork Portfolio and Self Reflection.** The Artwork Portfolio is a PDF document created by each individual student and will include digital photographs of all course work leading up to the Portfolio deadline and a short written self-reflection. You will submit a portfolio three times throughout the course. The assignment portfolio will be inclusive of all coursework (both in-class and homework) and will be evaluated holistically, in reference to course objectives and assignment criteria, utilizing the course rubric and University of Calgary grading scale.

It is very important that you document (with a smartphone or digital camera) every assignment you create for the course.

Each assignment within the portfolio will be given equal consideration in its capacity to inform a broad picture of your work and progress in the course. Criteria for each individual assignment highlighting objectives will accompany each assignment. Criteria for in-class assignments will be given verbally in class and criteria for homework assignments will be provided on D2L by the date the assignment is given.

Portfolio evaluation in the form of a letter grade and qualitative feedback will be provided to you approximately 1-2 weeks after each Portfolio is due. Upon receiving a grade and feedback on your complete portfolio, if you feel you would like to re-do, adjust or change a (already fully-completed) assignment(s) you may do so as long as you re-submit the assignment prior to the next portfolio due date. All re-done or adjusted assignments must be handed in December 7th, no exceptions.

* Without modifying the breadth or scope of the course in accordance with the above learning objectives, any changes made to the list (below) of required assignments for each portfolio will be given two weeks prior to the portfolio due date.

- 5. Abstract Collage Drawing
- 6. Gesture Drawing (Figure)
- 7. Tonal Drawing (Figure)

Artwork Portfolio and Self Reflection #3 will include:

- 1. Prescription Assignment Evidence of Process #1 (Research)
- 2. Prescription Assignment Evidence of Process #2 (Sketches)
- 3. Prescription Assignment Performance Plan (Written/Sketches)
- 4. Prescription Assignment Written Paragraph about Artistic Intent and Process
- 5. Prescription Assignment Artwork (Completed)

The Artwork Portfolio and Self Reflection(s) must be handed in as a PDF document (containing all relevant images) and written reflection component.

Writing

Several paragraphs of writing will be required for each Artwork Portfolio and Self Reflection assignment. The written component of each Artwork and Self Reflection assignment will be based on written communication skills and depth of critical self-inquiry into course work. Each written component will make up 2% (6% in total) of your "Critical Participation in Self-Reflection, Critique and Discussion" grade. An individual assignment outline will be given for each Artwork and Self Reflection assignment, providing guiding questions and criteria for the written portion.

Also, a short written statement (two paragraphs) will be a component of your "Prescription Assignment" assignment. Both written components will be evaluated as a part of your final based on the criteria outlined in the assignment and with the use of the course rubric.

A passing grade on each Artwork Portfolio and Self Reflection is necessary to pass this course.

Note: It is the student's responsibility to keep a copy of or any relevant documentation regarding each submitted assignment.

Late Assignment Policy

Each assignment is due on the date indicated by the instructor. In-class assignments will be due by the end of class or otherwise indicated by your instructor. Homework assignments will be due on the date indicated on the assignment outline (D2L.) Every assignment will be critiqued and discussed in class. Failure to submit artworks or on time for critique will result in a part letter grade reduction (example: B+ to a B) for the Artwork Portfolio and Self Reflection grade for which the assignment falls under. Submitting Artwork Portfolios late will receive an equivalent penalty. If, due to illness or mitigating circumstances, the student is unable to submit the assignment on time for critique, the student must email the instructor and submit the assignment the following class.

Only complete Artwork Portfolio and Self Reflection Assignments will be evaluated for marks. Artwork Portfolios and Self Reflections missing one or more assignments will receive an automatic "F". A failing grade for any Artwork Portfolio and Self Reflection Assignment will result in a failure of the course. It is up to the student to ensure that Artwork Portfolios are complete. If due to serious illness or extenuating circumstances, the student is unable to submit a complete portfolio, they are advised to contact their instructor immediately and may be advised to apply for a formal accommodation upon approval from a physician or recognized health professional.

Additional Information

Important Note about Absences and Arriving Late to Class:

Arriving late or being absent from class effects a student's ability to experience course activities and will therefore effect their ability to meet course expectations. Failure to meet such expectations due to being late or absent will be negatively reflected in work produced for the course in addition to the Classroom Participation and Professionalism and Critical Participation grades. Students are expected to attend all classes. Students are responsible for all material and assignments covered in class, even if they are absent. Students can obtain assignments they have missed due to absence by first consulting D2L, speaking with a classmate or by emailing their instructor with short questions or to book an in-person appointment. Missed coursework will not be taught over email.

Minimum Time Expectation for Homework Assignments:

At minimum, students should expect to spend <u>at least 5 hours of intensive work</u> on assignments (homework) outside of course hours. Please note that this is a minimum benchmark expectation and students may need to spend increased time outside of class in order to pass or be successful in this course.

Supplies:

Materials for Every Class

If possible, it is suggested that you obtain a locker in the Dept. of Art (see the "Lockers" section below).

All supplies can be purchased at the U of C Bookstore, ACAD Bookstore or another art supply store (best prices are at U of C or ACAD Bookstores). A toolbox or old backpack is handy for transportation of these materials long as it is not too heavy and can fit in your locker.

- -Sketchbook 11 x 14 inches or larger (*this course will not have too many sketchbook assignments so you are welcome to use a partially used sketchbook or one from another course.)

- -kneadable gum eraser
- -1 box of black vine charcoal
- -6 sticks or a box of black soft compressed charcoal (you can always split a box with another student)

- -traditional Chinese ink brush, size 6 (or approx. that size)
- -inexpensive large flat paint brush (approx. 2 inches)
- -1 bottle "India" ink
- -plastic dip pen holder and at least 3 nibs (approx. thin, medium and thick)
- -empty yogurt/margarine/coffee containers
- -1" masking tape
- -scissors
- -box of plastic thumb tacks (for hanging homework on the wall)
- 4 big bulldog clips (to attach paper to boards)
- or another of equivalent size or larger
- -1 tube black acrylic paint (student grade)
- -large pad of newsprint
- -1 large cardboard portfolio case (Pro Art, "Art Folio" 24 x 36 inches)

-Masonite board – *available at U of C supply store (definitely at Mac Hall location). This can be left at home or where you plan to complete your homework assignments. You do not need to bring this to class every week unless specified otherwise.

*The cardboard portfolio is preferable because it is larger than the standard size black nylon/leather portfolios. It is also very affordable. You can keep it closed with bulldog clips and either cut out holes for handles with a box cutter or glue/tape cardboard handles. You can also attach a rope to create a shoulder strap)

Materials Required for Specific Assignments TBA (Posted on D2L 1 Week Prior)

- -ruler, at least 30" in length
- -medium Mayfair
- -large Mayfair paper (very big cannot fit flat in portfolio) *At Dept. of Art location only
- -spray fixative (to only be used in the spray booth allowing 12 hours to off-gas in spray booth or well ventilated areas. Sprayed drawings cannot be taken into studios unless they have been given 12 hours to off-gas in a well ventilated area outside of the drawing studio.
- -Higher Quality Paper: Maidstone, Canson, Fabriano, Duralar, Rag Paper

Course Activities

Class activities will include instructor and student led presentations, guided activities, discussions, critiques and independent studio work. No field trips are currently planned, however, if an opportunity for a field trip emerges that compliments the learning objectives of the course and is during class hours, students will be notified in due time to allow for questions and organization of local and accessible travel (within Calgary via Calgary transit).

Note: students will be responsible for their own transportation and for any associated costs.
