# **Course Description**

Introductory course in observational and representational drawing. Creative exploration includes markmaking, hand-eye co-ordination, proportions, perspective, line, texture, figure-ground relationships and pictorial composition. Approaches may include pencil, conté, charcoal, pastel, pen and ink. These will be addressed in the context of research, problem-solving, visual fluency and conceptual development.

# **Objectives of the Course**

Upon satisfactory completion of the course:

- The student will have been introduced to and will have demonstrated a general understanding of various foundational concepts relevant to drawing as a historic and contemporary artistic practice, including but not limited to: line, shape, value, form, scale, texture, gesture, composition, movement, pictorial space, perspective, still life, figure drawing, landscape and alternative approaches.
- The student will have been exposed to the work and processes of various artists relevant to drawing from a historic and contemporary perspective, inclusive of artists and approaches marginalized by the dominant artistic canon.
- The student will have experimented and will have demonstrated competency with a range of media including but not limited to: charcoal, graphite, conté, pen, ink, mixed-media and non-traditional materials.

- The student will have experimented and demonstrated competency with the use of a range of material supports, including but not limited to: newsprint, mayfair, maidstone, fabriano, canson, duralar, rag papers, a sketchbook and non-traditional supports such as found materials.
- The student will have experimented and demonstrated competency with a range of traditional and non-traditional techniques relevant to drawing as a historic and contemporary practice, including but not limited to: observational drawing techniques, contour line, cross-hatching, shading, blind drawing, creating pictorial space, one-point and two-point empirical perspective, tromp l'oeil and abstraction.
- The student will have experimented and demonstrated competency in the use of various methodologies for drawing from a historic and contemporary perspective. Such methodologies include, but are not limited to, drawing from: observation, still life, live model, imagination, maquette and photography, etc.
- The student will have been exposed to and will demonstrate (through their work, discussion and research) a *consideration* of drawing as an interdisciplinary and expanded practice, inclusive of: drawing as a conceptual response, drawing and installation, drawing and sculpture, drawing and performance, drawing and collaboration, zines and hand-made artist books, drawing through animation and drawing through video.
- The student will have been exposed to and will have demonstrated a basic vocabulary for understanding and communicating concepts and methodologies relevant to drawing through course activities, small group and large group discussion and critiques.
- 9 The student will have demonstrated critical skills by articulating connections and possible interpretations of and between various concepts, techniques and methods in relationship to artistic objectives during class discussions, critiques and course activities.
- The student will have demonstrated critical self-reflection skills by conducting a thorough analysis of past course work and processes in order to present a thoughtful identification of strengths in drawing and areas of improvement. The student will identify specific goals for future creative and critical work in self-reflection assignments.
- 11 Student will have demonstrated adherence to following course expectations:
  - You are expected to help and be involved in creating a classroom atmosphere of safety, mutual participation, respect, criticality, discovery and diligent work.
  - You are expected to challenge yourself, your habits and your presumptions about art and art practice.

# Independent Labs, Guided Labs & Lab Reports

The lab component of this course will occur at various scheduled times throughout the course (see schedule). Some labs will be Guided Labs, where your presence in class is <u>absolutely mandatory.</u> During Guided Labs, your instructor will lead you through a hands-on creation activity. Independent Labs are designated course time set aside for independent work on course assignments. You are invited to work in the studio during Independent Labs, or if you find it necessary to work somewhere else to meet the learning objectives of your individual project (library, woodshop, other, etc.), you may do so. A completed lab report will be due by 6:00 PM on each day an Independent Lab is scheduled (submitted to D2L Dropbox).

The outline for the Lab Report is available on D2L (first class documents).

# Artwork Portfolio and Self Reflection (Evaluation of Course Assignments):

All in-class assignments will be due at the end of every class unless indicated otherwise by your instructor. Homework assignments will be due on the due date indicated on the individual assignment outline for critique. All assignments will be re-reviewed and evaluated by your instructor upon receiving your **Artwork Portfolio and Self Reflection.** The Artwork Portfolio is a PDF document created by each individual student and will include digital photographs of all course work leading up to the Portfolio deadline and a short written self-reflection. You will submit a portfolio three times throughout the course. The assignment portfolio will be inclusive of all coursework (both in-class and homework) and will be evaluated holistically, in reference to course objectives and assignment criteria, utilizing the course rubric and University of Calgary grading scale.

It is very important that you document (with a smartphone or digital camera) every assignment you create for the course.

Each assignment within the portfolio will be given equal consideration in its capacity to inform a broad picture of your work and progress in the course. Criteria for each individual assignment highlighting objectives will accompany each assignment. Criteria for in-class assignments will be given verbally in class and criteria for homework assignments will be provided on D2L by the date the assignment is given.

Portfolio evaluation in the form of a letter grade and qualitative feedback will be provided to you approximately 1-2 weeks after the portfolio is due. Upon receiving a grade and feedback on your complete portfolio, if you feel you would like to re-do, adjust or change a (already fully-completed) assignment(s), you may do so as long as you re-submit the assignment prior to the next portfolio due date. All re-done or adjusted assignments must be handed in by Feb 14<sup>th</sup> (midterm) and April 11<sup>th</sup> (final). No exceptions.

# Professionalism & Critical Participation:

Students are expected to attend all classes/labs and meaningfully participate in all activities and critiques. A mark will be given for each student each class/lab dependent upon their demonstrated level of professionalism and contribution to activity/critique. This grade will be affected by: arriving unprepared for class/lab activities (i.e., not bringing necessary supplies), failure participate in class/lab/critique activities or using personal technologies during designated technology-free times (see below). During critique activities, students are expected to present active critical interpretation skills artspecific vocabulary words learned in class.

# Independent Labs, Guided Labs & Lab Reports

Class activities will take different formats every class. The lab component of this course will occur at various scheduled times throughout the course (see schedule). Some labs will be Guided Labs, where your presence in class is <u>absolutely mandatory</u>. During Guided Labs, your instructor will lead you through a hands-on creation activity. Similarly, critiques require your mandatory presence in class. Independent Labs are designated course time set aside for independent work on course assignments. You are invited to work in the studio during Independent Labs, or if you find it necessary to work somewhere else to meet the learning objectives of your individual project (library, woodshop, other, etc.), you may do so. A completed lab report will be due by MIDNIGHT on each day an Independent Lab is scheduled (submitted to D2L Dropbox). The outline for the Lab Report is available on D2L (first class documents).

In the event that a serious illness or extenuating circumstances prompts a student to miss a significant number of classes/labs, the student is advised to contact their instructor immediately. Upon instructor consultation, the student may be advised to apply for a formal accommodation with approval from a physician or recognized health professional.

#### In-Class Timed Warm Up Activity

University life can be stressful and it can be difficult to transition into a creative mindset. Therefore, a guided, timed warm-up activity will be given for the first five-ten minutes of class. This important activity is to be done in your sketchbook or can be done using a "sketching" application on your mobile device (more info on apps will be given in class). After every warm-up activity, you are asked to submit a photo (taken with your mobile phone) of your drawing to the D2L dropbox by 3:40 PM. Exact instructions on how to do this will be given in class. If you do not have a mobile device, your instructor will provide you with an alternative form of submission however it is asked that you choose one method or the other to submit. All warm-up drawings must be submitted to D2L at or before 3:40 PM (no exceptions). Drawings cannot be submitted late nor can they be completed if the student is absent regardless of reason, circumstance or prior notification except in circumstances where official accommodation form Student Accessibility Services has been provided to the instructor at the beginning of the course. Warm-up drawings will be evaluated based on completion and late submissions will receive a 0.

# Writing

Several paragraphs of writing will be required for each Artwork Portfolio and Self Reflection assignment. The written component of each Artwork and Self Reflection assignment will be based on written communication skills and depth of critical self-inquiry into course work. Each written component will make up 3% (6% in total) of your "Critical Participation in Self-Reflection, Critique and Discussion" grade. An individual assignment outline will be given for each Artwork and Self Reflection assignment, providing guiding questions and criteria for the written portion.

A passing grade on each Artwork Portfolio and Self Reflection is not necessary to pass this course.

# **Late Assignment Policy**

Each assignment is due on the date indicated by the instructor. In-class assignments will be due by the end of class or otherwise indicated by your instructor. Homework assignments will be due on the date indicated on the assignment outline (D2L.) Every assignment will be critiqued and discussed in class. Failure to submit artworks or on time for critique will result in a part letter grade reduction (example: B+to a B) for the Artwork Portfolio and Self Reflection grade for which the assignment falls under. Submitting Artwork Portfolios late will receive an equivalent penalty. If, due to illness or mitigating circumstances, the student is unable to submit the assignment on time for critique, the student must email the instructor and submit the assignment the following class.

Only complete Artwork Portfolio and Self Reflection Assignments will be evaluated for marks. Artwork Portfolios and Self Reflections missing one or more assignments will receive an automatic "F". It is up to the student to ensure that Artwork Portfolios are complete. If, due to serious illness or extenuating circumstances, the student is unable to submit a complete portfolio, they are advised to contact their instructor immediately and may be advised to apply for a formal accommodation upon approval from a physician or recognized health professional.

#### **Additional Information**

Important Note about Absences, Arriving Late to Class and Catching Up after Absence

Arriving late or being absent from class effects a student's ability to experience course activities and will therefore effect their ability to meet course expectations. Failure to meet such expectations due to being late or absent will be negatively reflected in work produced for the course in addition to the Classroom Participation and Professionalism and Critical Participation grades.

Class will begin at 2:00 PM daily. **The classroom door will close at 2:10 sharp;** students are not to enter the classroom until 3:15 PM when the door will be opened again. The same process will occur in the break, when the classroom door will close at 3:30 PM and will opened again at 4:45 PM. This is to prevent against the disruption of course presentations, guided labs, and live figure drawing sessions by students due to lateness. If you are late one day, unless you have contacted your instructor regarding being late in advance (at least 1 day in advance), you are asked to join class at the times noted above. The student is responsible for catching up on course content missed due to lateness.

Students are expected to attend all classes except if in the case of scheduled Independent Labs (pending the student must be off-site to meet the learning objectives of their individual project which must be summarized in Lab Report). Students are responsible for all material and assignments covered

in class, even if they are absent. Students can obtain assignments they have missed due to absence by first consulting D2L, speaking with a classmate or by attending the Instructor's designated office hour. As a last resort, students may email their instructor with one or two specific questions regarding course work if absolutely necessary. Missed course content will not be taught over email.

# Missed Lecture/Lab Activity Summary:

If a student is absent for a class, it is asked that the student take a few minutes to briefly fill out a Missed Lecture/Lab Activity Summary and submit it to the Dropbox folder (titled Missed Lecture/Lab Activity Summary Folder) within one week of the student's absence. This short form asks that the student identify the exact date(s) of the lecture/lab(s) missed as well as a brief summary of the missed activities and learning objectives of assignments explored during the missed class. This information can be easily obtained by the student by consulting D2L for weekly class activities and by consulting assignment outlines. The completion of this form does not excuse the student for their absence, nor does it make up for content missed due to absence. Rather, the completion of the form helps the student to identify learning gaps as a result of absence from course content in order to better define a program for future research and success. Failure to submit this form within one week of absence from class will result in a half-letter grade reduction (example B+ to B) of the student's Classroom Community and Professionalism grade

# Minimum Time Expectation for Homework Assignments:

At minimum, students should expect to spend <u>at least as much time on homework as time spent in class</u> (approximately 5 hours/week in Fall and Winter semesters or 20hours/week in Spring Semester (3 Week Course). Please note that this is a minimum benchmark expectation and students may need to spend increased time outside of class to pass or be successful in this course.

# Supplies:

# **Materials for Every Class**

If possible, it is suggested that you obtain a locker in the Dept. of Art (see the "Lockers" section below).

All supplies can be purchased at the U of C Bookstore (except large Mayfair paper), ACAD Bookstore (Supplier of large Mayfair paper) or another art supply store (best prices are at U of C or ACAD Bookstores). A toolbox or old backpack is handy for transportation of these materials as long as it is not too heavy and can fit in your locker.

- -Sketchbook 11 x 14 inches or larger (\*this course will not have too many sketchbook assignments so you are welcome to use a partially used sketchbook or one from another course.)
- -assorted graphite pencils 2B, 4B, 6B
- -small pencil sharpener
- -1 black fine point sharpie pens
- -1 rubber eraser
- -kneadable gum eraser
- -1 stick of black vine charcoal
- -3 sticks or a box of black soft compressed charcoal (you can always split a box with another student)
- -set of 1 white, 1 black and 1 sepia conte
- -traditional Chinese ink brush, size 6 (or approx. that size)
- -1 bottle of black "India" ink
- -plastic dip pen holder and 3 nibs (approx. thin, medium and thick)
- -empty yogurt/margarine/coffee containers
- -1" masking tape
- -scissors
- -box of plastic thumb tacks (for hanging homework on the wall)
- 4 big bulldog clips (to attach paper to boards)
- -large pad of newsprint
- -1 large cardboard portfolio case (Pro Art, "Art Folio" 24 x 36 inches)
- -Masonite board \*available at U of C supply store (definitely at Mac Hall location). This can be left at home or where you plan to complete your homework assignments. You do not need to bring this to class every week unless specified otherwise.
- \*The cardboard portfolio is preferable because it is larger than the standard size black nylon/leather portfolios. It is also very affordable. You can keep it closed with bulldog clips and either cut out holes for handles with a box cutter or glue/tape cardboard handles. You can also attach a rope to create a shoulder strap).

# **Materials Required for Specific Assignments**

- 4 sheets of Maidstone or Stonehenge paper (white)
- 1 Sheet of Frosted Mylar or Duralar (Approx 3 feet if off a roll)
- -1 2 Sheets Large Mayfair paper (very big cannot fit flat in portfolio) \*Available at ACAD Bookstore only (Open 8:30 AM 4PM, Closed 12 1, \*Call before)
- -spray fixative (to only be used in the spray booth allowing 12 hours to off-gas in spray booth or well ventilated areas. Sprayed drawings cannot be taken into studios unless they have been given 12 hours to off-gas in a well ventilated area outside of the drawing studio.

#### **Course Activities**

Class activities will include instructor and student led presentations, guided activities, discussions, critiques and independent studio work. No field trips are currently planned, however, if an opportunity for a field trip emerges that compliments the learning objectives of the course and is during class hours, students will be notified in due time to allow for questions and organization of local and accessible travel (within Calgary via Calgary transit).

Note: students will be responsible for their own transportation and for any associated costs.
