Course Description

Theory and methods of creating meaningful art experiences for young children (ages 3-8), with a practical component.

Prerequisites &/or Co-requisites

Art 205, 231 and 233 or consent of the Department.

Objectives of the Course

Successful completion of this course will be indicated by evidence of:

- •growing skill in the continuing use of art materials and ideas;
- •developing competence in self-<u>reflection</u> and <u>analysis</u> in relation to attitudes and experiences with young children;
- •ability to <u>articulate</u> understanding of the role of art in young children's development, and of the role of the teacher within that relationship;
- •ability to plan and work collegially in a team situation.

Course Activities

Activities include lectures, demonstrations, discussions, film and slide presentations, field trips, studio work, and **most especially, practical work with young children**. A reasonable time commitment will be a minimum of six hours per week of out-of-class, course-related work (e.g., project research, journal writing, reading, planning) in addition to the six hours of combined lecture and lab required for the course.

The instructor as part of her research may document activities in this course. Students who wish to be excluded from such documentation are free to do so without penalty. Informed consent forms will be provided in the first week of the class.
