This class is designed to introduce students to the basic principles of digital sculpting, using the programs Sculptris and Zbrush, current trends in the combination of digital practices and 3D modelling, and the methods of producing physical versions of 3D digital models

Late Assignment Policy

Except in highly unusual circumstances, assignments cannot be turned in late for credit. Documented means a fully explanatory note from an appropriate authority, e.g., physician or counsellor.

In all cases where students do not turn in work on time without such documentation, a grade of zero will be entered into the gradebook for that assignment.

Additional Information

Students are required to own an external USB storage device, such as a USB flash drive or external hard drive, with at least four gigabytes of available storage, and to save their work both in their Dropbox account and on the memory key. Losing a file due to file storage errors is not a valid excuse for not turning homework in.

In addition, students are encouraged to purchase a drawing tablet for their computer (e.g., a Wacom Intuos); lower-end models are acceptable, but students who intend to pursue further work in digital media

may wish to invest in a model that will carry them through future courses. No assignment specifically depends on tablet use.

The final assignment is expected to cost between \$30 and \$120 in printing costs, depending on size and materials used.
