Course Description

Focuses on concepts, issues, and techniques of video as an art medium. Students will gain experience and a working knowledge of concept development, video shooting and digital editing, in the context of contemporary art theory and practice.

Prerequisites &/or Co-requisites

Art 235.

Objectives of the Course

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be familiar with the historical and technical rudiments of Video Art and will have developed production skills necessary to produce quality video images. In addition, the student will have some understanding of the expressive potential of video as an artistic medium

Textbooks and Readings

The required texts for this course are on the course section of the D2L portal.

Assignments and Evaluation

There is no final examination in this course. Marks are based on term work. Final grades will be calculated as follows:

Evaluation Criteria:

All student work will be evaluated based on the following criteria:

Conceptual Issues:

- 1. Contemporary relevance of concept
- 2. Originality of idea and approach to idea
- 3. Research process and exploration of ideas
- 4. Relationship between topic and medium (use of media and presentation)
- 5. Clarity of concept/ideas in relation to visual and auditory material

Technical Issues:

- 1. Sound levels and clarity
- 2. Image clarity and fluidity
- 3. Overall pacing
- 4. Presentation

Assignments and Grading distribution as follows:

- Project 1: Emotional Loops (20%) Due date: Jan 29th
- Project 2: Video Imaging tools (15%) Due date: Feb 14th
- Project 3: Conceptual split screen (20%) Due Date: March 7th
- Project 4: 4K Green Screen Loops (Collaborative) (20%) Due date: April 11th
- D2L 'blog' responses to Class Screenings (15%)
 Blog post assessment:
 - 6 blog posts worth 2% each for a total of 12%
 - 1 final blog summary worth 3%
- Mandatory participation in class critiques (10%)

Students will be required to attend in-class critiques the day that each project is due. In order to earn the full points for this assessment section, you must attend class and participate in the critique discussions.

Receiving a passing grade on any particular component is not a requirement of the course.

Writing

Students will post to the class blog on D2L in response to assigned readings paired with the video screenings. This will be an important part of student evaluation in the course worth 15%. Students will not be assessed based on technical details of writing (grammar, punctuation, spelling, etc.).

The blog posts will function in a journal entry format of where students will be free to respond with a level of criticality and analysis surrounding the weekly reading and video work.

Course Activities

The course will attempt to balance the theory components of lectures with the technical aspects of instruction during lab times.

Lectures will consist of:

- Film/Video screenings
- In-Class Discussions / D2L 'blog posts'

Labs will consist of:

- Workshops/tutorials so that students may familiarize themselves with the equipment and concepts.
- Examination of experimental approaches to a history of film and video making.
- Traditional & Alternative approaches to video editing using computer software (Final Cut Pro/Premiere, Max 7's 'Vizzie Objects', etc.)

Written assignments + Weekly readings will also be assigned throughout the term.

The outcome of these labs + lectures will be a series of individual and collaborative projects that will serve to inform students of various approaches to film + video art, both past and present. These tutorials and assignments will culminate toward the end of term with individual projects in which students may explore one area of research more specifically or combine their knowledge from all sections.

Exhibition of student works and critiques will be open to all students and faculty who may wish to observe or participate. Critiques will occur throughout the term (Please see the timeline for more detailed information).
