Course Description	An introduction to computers and programming within the context of artistic practice. Algorithms within the arts domain, and applications, including interactive and dynamic applications, across range of artistic practices including: images, audio, animation, multimedia, web, and installations. Students will develop in-class and take home projects, as well as a final project of their own design. This course, at this time, uses Alice, GameMaker and the Processing language.
Course Objectives	 Upon successful completion of this course, students should: 1. Be able to write basic programs in Alice, Gamemaker, Processing; 2. Understand the ideas behind generative art, and the use of algorithms in a creative process; 3. Be able to create artistic works using these paradigms in a specified language; 4. Be familiar with basic techniques in visualization using a computer; 5. Understand basic strategies for interaction design and their implementation; 6. Understand how to create and manipulate computer images.
