Course Description

Theoretical and practical applications of basic electronic principles and techniques involving the use of electronics in contemporary art practices. Will include applied experiences with hardware and visual programming environments.

Prerequisites &/or Co-requisites

One half course in Art or consent of the Department.

Objectives of the Course

The material in this course will enable students to:

- Understand emerging technological art practices such as interactive media and physical computing
- Develop electronic artworks conceptually and technically, with a focus on aesthetics, functionality, and meaning

Students will be expected to

- Present their research, progress and completed assignments to the class on a regular basis
- Maintain a record of their progress via the class website
- Participate in critiques of student work, identifying the strengths and potential improvements of each project
 - technically: Does the technical execution of the work serve the student's artistic intention?
 - o **conceptually:** Does the work effectively communicate a clear concept? Does the work generate sufficient discussion around a particular idea or interpretation?

Assignments and Evaluation

Unit assignments: Projects that encapsulate the technical skills covered in each unit. These assignments are graded based on the presentation of the project, as well as the documentation thereof. Unit assignments *must* be completed at the beginning of class on the date of the critique. Documentation may be posted to the class website no later than the following Monday class.

Midterm assignment: An expansion upon one of the unit assignments. Detailed information about the midterm will be distributed in the weeks leading up to the assignment.

Final project: Students will be required to propose their final and consult with the instructor prior to its execution. Grading of the final project will be based on proposal, presentation and documentation.

Website postings and unit research: Grades will be given for consistently maintained postings to the class D2L site. Weekly postings may include documentation of progress for projects, documentation of completed projects and research.

Participation: This grade is based on the student's engagement in the class, in terms of punctuality, participation in class discussions and critiques, and contribution to a supportive and collaborative class environment.
