Course Description

Fundamental technical and aesthetic considerations in the use of the still Digital Single Lens Reflex (DSLR) camera and basic use of the microcomputer in support of digital image processing in art.

This course may not be repeated for credit.

Prerequisites &/or Co-requisites

Prerequisite(s): One half-course equivalent in Art.

Antirequisite(s): Credit for both Art 336 and 337 will not be allowed.

Objectives of the Course

This introductory course introduces the technical and fundamental techniques of the DSLR camera to gain an understanding of the aesthetic and technical areas of photography as a fine art. It is designed to develop the hands-on skills necessary to produce and identify the elements of a good photograph and to acquire a thorough working knowledge of digital equipment. Through a series of lectures, discussions and exercises, students will explore technical and creative aspects of digital photography for personal expression. Students will produce imagery related to discussion topics. Coursework includes shooting assignments, readings, discussions and a midterm exam.

Students are expected to contribute to class discussion because the creation of art is a social act; it is about the exchange of ideas. When a photograph is created and shown it has the power to affect and communicate an experience to a larger audience. We will discuss and analyze how the pictures we produce become a part of that dialogue.

Assignments and Evaluation

Marks are based on participation, mid-term exam, mid-term work (Project 1) and the final Project.

Completion of all assignments and projects is a minimum requirement of a passing grade in this course.

Printed Metadata must accompany each assignment and include: file name, Lens aperture, focal length, camera shutter speed, ISO sensitivity, white balance.

Note: It is the student's responsibility to keep a copy of each submitted assignment.
