Course Description

Theory and practice of drawing the human figure at a developing level involving an extended range of drawing media.

Prerequisites &/or Co-requisites

Art 241

Objectives of the Course

This course is designed to provide the student with an opportunity to explore the range of materials, processes, and ideas related to figure drawing. While it is a studio-based course, there will also be opportunities to engage in viewing and responding to historical and contemporary works of art.

Students will also explore various aspects of art history and criticism so as to become more knowledgeable about the importance of the human figure in fine art and in pop culture and to develop skills in representing the figure in two-dimensional art.

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, the student will demonstrate:
understanding of compositional vocabulary and concepts;
growth in skill in the handling of art materials and processes;
awareness of, and appreciation for, the role of the human figure in fine art and in pop culture.

Textbooks and Readings

You are not required to purchase a textbook. Selected podcasts and readings will be assigned throughout the term. You can find links to them on D2L.

Assignments and Evaluation

Marks are based on term work and will depend on the following:

Five studio projects will be assigned, each worth **17%** of the final mark. All projects must be completed to pass the course.

Gesture drawing is worth **15%** and will be based on in-class sessions with live models.

Attendance at every class is therefore **STRONGLY** advised for success in this course.

Evaluation will be based on...

1. Evidence within the work of an understanding about the structure, mechanics and detailed features of the human figure.
2. Evidence within the work that the tools and techniques were used correctly and that the student has paid attention to details.
3. The student's level of commitment to the course, as evidenced by meeting deadlines (see "Late Assignment Policy" below).

Additional Information

Tools & Materials

The estimated cost is approximately \$100 to \$150. Purchase of all of the following tools and materials is highly recommended:

A straight edge, an Exacto knife with several #11 replacement blades, a utility knife with retractable snap-off blades, scissors, clean rags or paper towels, a bar of hand soap, a role of painter's masking tape, a set of graphite pencils with different hardness (8B, 6B, 4B, 2B, HB, 2H, 4H, 6H, 8H), a kneadable gum eraser, a can of "Krylon Workable Fixative", black and white Conte sticks, brown and iron-oxide coloured Conte sticks, compressed charcoal, willow or vine charcoal, a large blending stomp, a good pencil sharpener, a bottle of India ink (waterproof), several nylon brushes (round, flat and filbert-shaped, each in sizes #1, #4, #8), a large newsprint pad, 10 to 15 sheets of Mayfair Coverstock, 2 sheets of Claire Fontaine middle-grey paper, 1 or more sheets of Arches (or comparable) hot-pressed watercolour paper (from a minimum thickness of 140 lb to a maximum thickness of 400 lb), a small sketchbook. This list is also posted on D2L.

There is an Art Store located in the Art Building, next to the main office (hours are posted on the door). The Bookstore in the MacEwan Student Centre also sells art supplies, as do several other shops around town; just Google 'Art Supplies'.

Course Activities

Activities include lectures and demonstrations, studio practice and gallery visits. Studio activities will include gesture and sustained-drawing sessions with live models, work with pen & ink wash.

Students may also participate in other university activities such as attending lectures by visiting speakers and other events connected to the Art Department and The Nickle Galleries.

Students will be responsible for any admission fees and for their own transportation.
