Course Description

An exploration of the cognitive, emotional, and social development of infants, children and adolescents learning art. Students will engage in experiential learning in formal and informal settings.

Credit for <u>Art 342</u> and any of 305, 307 or 393 will not be allowed.

Objectives of the Course

Upon satisfactory completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Form a rationale for art in diverse learning settings;
- 2. Demonstrate an understanding of the role of art in human development from birth to the end of adolescence;
- 3. Demonstrate an expanded repertoire of skills and knowledge of art materials and concepts appropriate to human development from birth to the end of adolescence;
- 4. Demonstrate the ability to design experiences that will support development of humans from birth through adolescence based on sound learning and developmental theories.

Student's participation requires active participation in class discussions, field observation and practical teaching experiences, including:

(1) Attendance at field and practical experiences and in-class planning and de-briefing sessions;

(2) Documenting your learning during Art 342 and that of those involved in the practical experience;

- (3) Interactive participation in class discussions;
- (4) Active membership in group work.

Writing

Where written work is required it is expected that attention be paid to correct spelling, grammar and composition. Poorly written documentation and blog entries will receive lower grades than those that are written with correct spelling, grammar and are well composed.

You must receive a passing grade on each component of the course in order to receive a passing grade on the whole. In other words, if you fail one component of the course, you will receive a failing grade.

Students who are unable to complete a required component of the course must make arrangements with the instructor prior to the due date for an alternative assignment.

Activities include lecture/seminars led by the instructor, student-led seminars, class discussions, student presentations, films, slide presentations; studio experiences in art making; practical experiences in the field and may include guest lectures as well as field trips. As required, students will be expected to assume responsibility for their own transportation to and from any such field trips, as well as any admission costs that may apply.

NOTE: The nature of the course requires interaction and co-operation. Class participation in discussions, presentations and field trips, and personal involvement in projects and activities will be taken into account when assigning grades.
