Course Description

Technical and conceptual exploration of sculpture through materials and processes. This may include a range of methods such as mold-making, casting, assemblage, carving, welding, forging, riveting, time-based media, installation or digital media.

Prerequisites &/or Co-requisites

Art 233

Objectives of the Course

This course will build upon the skills and understanding that the student acquired in Art 233 (Art Fundamentals: 3D). The student will examine sculpturing as primarily a meaning-making activity that "embeds" a semblance of our experiences, emotions and beliefs within visual, 3D forms and manipulated environments.

By the end of this course, the student will understand the evolution of sculpture from the formalist explorations of early 20th century sculptors to the conceptual works of contemporary artists: a transition leading inexorably to "context-sensitive" objects and environments.

The student will also acquire an understanding of how to undertake the process of defining a problem (the basis for a project), researching support materials, experimenting with possible solutions, judging the success and failure of said solutions and then executing a 3D artwork (or manipulated environment) using appropriate materials, tools and techniques.

Lastly, the student will acquire a range of skills such as advanced mold-making (multi-part, silicone, alginate, Flex-wax, life-casting), carving, assemblage, hand-building, modeling, maquette-making, finishing and displaying a completed 3D artwork.

Assignments and Evaluation

1) Two sculptural projects will be assigned. The student will be expected to conduct some amount of research (e.g., the online review of related artworks, reading, sourcing supplies for the projects). The student will also conduct experiments to aid in the creation of the sculptures (e.g., making a maquette, testing a process).

Each project will address one (or more) of the five themes below:

- 1. Material as Concept
- 2. Object as Concept
- 3. Action as Concept
- 4. Place as Concept
- 5. Phenomena as Concept

Note: Each project may be informed by ideas from other subjects — politics, psychology, sociology, mathematics, philosophy, science, ethics, cosmology, religion, spirituality, history, economics — or some other area of personal interest to the student.

- 2) The student will write two short statements (of no more than 100 words each) that provide context for the projects, thereby, helping viewers to more fully understand and appreciate the meaning within the work.
- 3) The student will be expected to participate in discussions during class and during the critiques of each project (conducted as a group when the project is complete). The student will also be expected to participate in a group exhibit by installing work in one of the Art Department galleries (the instructor will make the arrangements for this).

Marks will be based on an objective set of rubrics (accessed via D2L) that address the effectiveness with which the artwork conveys the student's intentions to the viewer.

- Each project (or manipulated environment) is worth 30% of the final grade for a total of 60/100%.
- o Each statement is worth 10% of the final grade for a total of 20/100%.
- Participation during critiques and class-time is worth 10% and participation in the group exhibition is worth 10%, for a total of 20/100% of the final grade. Half of the Participation Mark will depend on the number of comments and questions asked during class and during critiques more is better. There will be a D2L rubric for this. The other half of the mark will depend on the student installing one or both of his/her projects in the group exhibit in Gallery 621 (June 18 to 29).

Students must achieve a passing grade on <u>all</u> components in order to pass the course.

Writing

The instructor will expect the student to use proper grammar and spelling in written work (statements) and is happy to review preliminary drafts in preparation for the final document.

Additional Information

Materials: The student will be expected to purchase the necessary materials for projects. Some cost savings may be realized by sharing materials with classmates (e.g., splitting the cost of a bag of plaster) and by looking for things that may have been used or are castoffs. The instructor may also purchase materials in bulk at a discounted rate (to be discussed in class).

Cost: The total cost for materials will vary depending on the student's ideas for a finished work, but should be no more than the cost of a good textbook for most other courses.

Tools: The student may access the Art Department's Woodshop and Metalshop, both of which have many excellent machines and hand tools. It would, nevertheless be wise to purchase a basic set of tools (which are extremely useful, in or out of the studio). The recommended items are:

- Olfa knife, with snap off blades
- Exacto knife, with replacement blades
- o Scissors
- Retractable tape measure
- Hammer
- o Pliers
- o Crescent wrench, adjustable
- o Screwdriver, with interchangeable bits
- o Carpenter's pencil, graphite
- Sandpaper, assorted grits
- o Paint brushes, nylon, assorted sizes
- Small set of drill bits, assorted sizes from 1/16" to 3/8"
- Set of clay tools (U of C Bookstore)
- Tool box

Cost: These items can be purchased at a dollar store or a hardware store — Canadian Tire, Home Depot, RONA, Walmart — and should cost no more than \$100.
