Critiques

Critiques take a level of open-mindedness, courage, maturity, and patience to be most effective. They are as important as the exercises and assignments themselves in your development as an artist. The professional, critical analysis from your instructor is crucial to your growth and development. It is very important to develop communication skills and attitudes necessary for your fullest benefit and participation during critiques. Do not confuse "constructive critical feedback" from your instructor or classmates as "negative feedback." As students of art, you must demand an atmosphere of "critical" support and "respect" for your goals of "excellence."
