Course Description

Theory and practice of art using electronic media; Introduction to technical, aesthetic and conceptual aspects of the use of electronics in art.

Prerequisites &/or Co-requisites

One studio half course at the 300 level or consent of the department.

Objectives of the Course

This course will provide students with the opportunity to develop an integrated understanding of the use of electronics in art. This is primarily a studio course, which will be supplemented and informed by the exploration of aspects of art history, emerging dominant cultural themes and responsible/conscious use of technology in art; thus building technical skills as well as contributing to and inspiring the student's artistic direction. There will also be opportunities to view and explore conceptual and commercial art objects and spaces. Upon successful completion of the course, the student will demonstrate an understanding of techniques and processes inherent to digital art practice, a growth in technical skills, a greater awareness of current conceptual themes and issues. and appreciation of the impact of electronic art and technology in contemporary society.

Textbooks and Readings

Students are not required to purchase a textbook. Supplementary readings will be assigned throughout the term. These will be available online via blackboard/email or held on reserve in the (TFDL) Library.

Assignments and Evaluation

This is a studio art course where students will complete a series of studio art projects, applying traditional aesthetic principles of art making, to explore conceptual themes using electronic media. The resulting electronic art works should demonstrate innovation, technical skill, aesthetic principles and creative, reflective thought. Projects will be supplemented and informed by assigned readings, class discussions, and critiques. Evaluation will be based on:

- a) Participation and preparedness; where It is expected that students will come to class on time, with assigned readings and projects completed on the date due. During critiques and informal class discussion, students will bring thoughtful questions and insights to offer, and be prepared to discuss the relevance and application of course materials. Participation is worth 10% of the final grade, and will include your contribution to class critiques. Critiques are an extremely important aspect of the course and will be held at the completion of each project.
- b) Students will complete five electronic art studio projects, including one more extensive final project.

All projects must be completed to pass the course.

Late projects will be subject to a grade reduction of 5% per day.

Course Activities

Course activities include lectures, assigned readings and discussion, studio practice and critiques. Studio activities will include the use of programs and technologies offered in the IAML lab including Adobe CS, Motion, Cinema 4D, Logic Pro, Finale. Students may have the option of creating work for the HD Digital Dome Theatre at Telus Spark; an immersive art and technology environment. Students are expected to put in a minimum of six hours per week on out-of-class research, project completion and additional course related activities. Students may also participate in other university activities such as attending lectures by visiting speakers and other events connected to the Art Department and the Nickle Galleries.
