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Topic Description

Students enrolled in ART 465 pursue individually designed arts-based research projects in photography, and examine approaches to editing, sequencing, and presenting projects to the audience(s) envisioned for the work.

Prerequisites &/or Co-requisites

One full-course equivalent in 300-level studio course.

Objectives of the Course

The goal of Advanced Visual Research Methods is to immerse students in the process of doing arts-based research using the medium of photography. During the term we will assess, critique and refine the photographic work produced, examine approaches to editing and sequencing photographic work, and conceptualize and plan a strategy (or strategies) for presenting the work to an appropriate audience.

Topics to be covered include:

- proposal writing
- visual research strategies
- · approaches to shooting photographic projects
- visual styles and aesthetics
- pairing words and images
- photo editing
- building visual sequences
- exhibition, publication and distribution strategies

Textbooks and Readings

Readings will be assigned during the term in conjunction with lecture and research topics.

1 Photographic work will be evaluated according to the following criteria:

- Technical proficiency (exposure, lighting, focus, rendition of color, etc.)
- Aesthetic awareness (attention to framing, composition, stylistic approach)
- Conceptual clarity (the photograph suits its intended purpose)

Photographs must be submitted as specified in course assignments, including file size and orientation.

Note: Photographic work submitted will be discussed in class critiques. Students are expected to be able to articulate their ideas and intentions in these class discussions. Students are also expected to actively participate in discussions and critiques through productive input and commentary. Class participation is a necessary component of the course. Attendance and participation will be factored into the determination of final course grades.

³ The first draft of the project edit will be evaluated as follows:

- Completeness
- Coherent logic and rationale
- Appropriateness of editing and sequencing choices for intended meanings

- Ambitiousness
- Completeness
- Coherent logic and rationale
- Appropriateness of editing and sequencing choices for intended meanings
- Visual impact
- Professionalism demonstrated in the preparation and presentation of the work
