Learning Outcomes

Students who successfully complete the course will:

- 1. Develop vocabulary, understanding of formal elements and ability to interpret architectural drawings in order to process the visual analysis of art and architecture and read related texts more effectively.
- 2. Develop knowledge of the history and significance of art and architecture from Prehistory through the Later Middle Ages
- 3. Learn the characteristics of major examples of art and architecture from this period and understand their interpretation in light of pertinent socio-economic, political, religious and stylistic influences.
- 4. Practice skills that are necessary for the examination of art and the study of art history: observation, visual analysis, ability to compare and contrast, and critical thinking.

Methods of Instruction

The methods of instruction consist of presentations and discussions three times a week using PowerPoint and some films, assigned readings, Blackboard postings of visuals, one field assignment, an early exam, a mid-term exam and a final exam. The exams will be multiple-choice based on visuals and course knowledge.
