Art History (ARHI) 423 Lecture 01 Photography In The Twentieth Century Winter 2016

Course Description

The development of photography from 1900 to the present, with attention to the theory and criticism of photography as an art form.

Prerequisites &/or Co-requisites

None.

Objectives of the Course

Photography in the 20th Century surveys key developments, issues and ideas with respect to the medium of photography. While taking a chronological approach, the course links the past with the present, the old with the new. Considered within the purview of the course will be multiple paradigms in the use of the medium, chief among them: fine art, information, and persuasion. While tracing the emergence of these categories, the course will examine the boundaries and convergences amongst them. In addition, the course will attend to the widespread popularity of photography, and reflect upon the significance of the claim, "We are all photographers now."

Students successfully completing this course will:

- Acquire a broad knowledge of the history of the medium
- Understand the importance of social and institutional contexts of photographic production
- Understand the fundamentals of photographic aesthetics, their development, and change over time and in relation to contexts of use
- Know how to raise important questions in response to historical narratives
- Understand how to critically analyze and assess photographic images with respect to their aesthetics, contexts and uses.
- Clearly articulate their responses to photographs verbally and in writing.

Textbooks and Readings

The course text is Mary Warner Marien, *Photography: A Cultural History*, 4th Edition (2014). Additional readings will be assigned in class.

Assignments and Evaluation

The course will be structured so that lectures on course reading material will be given on Tuesday class meetings, and discussion of the issues raised will take place on Thursdays. Discussions will be organized around questions submitted by students in advance of the Thursday class meeting.

1. Students will be required to write one substantive question for discussion, drawn from the reading and lecture for the week. There will be 10 discussion questions due during the semester. Questions must be submitted via D2L no later than 5pm on the Wednesday preceding the Thursday class meeting. Questions will be graded on a 10-point scale. Late submissions will not be accepted and will receive a score of 0.

Question-writing submissions will consist of:

A 100 to 300-word description of a question that could be discussed in class.

Your description should describe the question, explain its context with respect to the reading and lecture, and briefly explain why it is an important question.

You should also include a one-sentence summary of your question on a separate line.

The question might be remedial, seeking clarification/elaboration of an important point made in the reading and lecture. The question might identify an issue that is raised by the reading and lecture. Or the question might seek to explore parallels or divergences between past and present issues, ideas or practices suggested by the reading and lecture.

- 2. Participation in class discussions is a crucial component of the course. Attendance is therefore mandatory. Engagement with questions discussed in class, as well as the quality and productivity of student contributions to discussion throughout the semester will be factored into the class participation grade.
- 3. Students will submit a 2,500 word (approx.10-pages) term paper on the work of a contemporary photographer. Papers are to be submitted in electronic format in Microsoft Word via D2L; the details of the assignment will be distributed and described in class.
