Course description:	Foundation course in three-dimensional art making. Creative exploration may include media such as plaster, clay, wood, and found objects. Technical approaches may include mold-making, casting, additive and subtractive processes. Form, mass, volume, and materials will be addressed in the context of research, problem solving, visual fluency and conceptual development.
Prerequisites and/or co- requisites:	None
Course Objectives:	This introductory course will provide the student with an opportunity to explore the range of materials, processes, and ideas related to art & design, primarily in three dimensions. While it is a studio–based course, there will also be opportunities to engage in viewing and responding to art works, architecture, advertising, and consumer objects.
	Students will also explore some aspects of art history and criticism so as to become more knowledgeable about the importance of 3D design (in art and in everyday life) and to develop personal design and fabrication skills.
	 Upon satisfactory completion of the course, the student will have gained an understanding of: 3D art & design vocabulary and concepts the growth of skills in the handling of art-making tools and materials an understanding of sculptural processes an appreciation for the role of art and 3D design in society an appreciation for the evolution of sculpture, from pre-history to the present

Assessment	Guidelines for Submitting Assignments: At the end of each project, the student will		
Expectations:	submit her project for grading by placing it in a designated exhibition space chosen by the instructor. The work must be accompanied by a label clearly displaying the student's name.		
	To pass this course, all projects and participation must be completed. A passing grade is NOT required for every project to pass this course.		
	Missed or Late Assignments: All projects must be submitted for marking by the due dates listed above. Grades for late assignments will be reduced by 5% per day. If a component of the course is missed, the student must arrange to complete the work within the timeframe of the current semester.		
	Expectations for Writing: Writing skills are important to academic study across all disciplines. Consequently, instructors may use their assessment of writing quality as a factor in the evaluation of student work. Please refer to the Undergraduate Calendar E.2 Writing Across the Curriculum policy for details.		
Additional Costs and Information:	Materials: You will be expected to purchase the necessary materials for your projects. The Woodshop carries a supply of plaster, clay, plywood, Styrofoam, lumber and many other items. You will also find building materials at most hardware stores, such as Lowe's and Home Depot.		
	<u>Cost</u> : The total cost for your materials will depend on your ideas but should be no more than the cost of a good textbook for most other courses. Cost savings may be realized by sharing materials with your classmates (e.g., splitting a bag of plaster) and by recycling used items. The class, as a group, might be able to purchase some materials in bulk at a discounted rate (to be discussed). Some costs (especially for the Found Object Project) can be reduced by collecting materials and objects from around the home and from family and friends.		
	<u>Tools</u> : You will have access to the Art Department's Woodshop and Metal Shop, both of which have an assortment of machines and tools. Nevertheless, it would be wise to purchase a basic set of tools (extremely useful, at home or in the studio).		
	<u>Cost</u> : Some tools may be purchased at the U of C Bookstore; other tools may be purchased at a dollar store or a hardware store — Dollar Giant, Dollar Tree, Walmart, Canadian Tire, Home Depot, Lowe's, Rona — and should cost no more than \$100.		
	The recommended items are:		
	 Three hog-hair or nylon paint brushes, filbert-shaped with long handles (sizes #2, #4, #8) a palette knife, a mixing palette (e.g., a plastic pail lid), containers for water (e.g., yogurt containers) 		
	a straight edge or a ruler a bottle of white glue		
	a role of painter's masking tape a sanding block		
	 a utility knife with retractable snap-off blades a toolbox in which to store your tools 		
	a package of assorted clay tools sketchbook, any size		

	 an Exacto knife with several #11 replacement blades clean rags or paper towels, a bar of hand soap a kneadable gum eraser scissors
