Course Description

An introductory course in current photographic methods, including digital photography, digital image processing, and the presentation of photographs.

Students are required to have a digital SLR or Mirrorless camera with, full manual, and **RAW file format capabilities. Lenses with wide-angle (18 mm to 55 mm) and telephoto (55 mm to 250 mm) capabilities (or equivalent). Having only one wide-angle or telephoto lens will reduce your ability to take specific types of photographs.

- 1. Choosing the right camera setting for each assignment.
- 2. Controlling the light to fulfill the assignment correctly.
- 3. Focusing
- 4. Choosing the right shutter speed/aperture/ISO for each assignment.

Conceptual Issues:

- 1. Contemporary relevance of concepts
- 2. Originality of ideas and approach to ideas
- 3. Research process and exploration of ideas
- 4. Clarity of the capacity to articulate concepts/ideas

Quizzes (x 3; graded equally) based on readings, 15 points (15%)

Students are advised to read the assigned readings carefully and completely before coming to class on the day they are assigned (i.e., John Szarkowski's text should be read before class on July 23rd). It is expected that every student will be ready to participate/contribute in a meaningful way to every class meeting. Remember that "effective participation does not solely consist in mastery: doubts, struggles, inspirations, connections, and critiques are equally valid." Coming to class with questions, identifying passages that you did not understand, or expressing reasoned disagreements are each effective ways to participate in class.

It is recommended that you begin reading the texts as soon as possible to have the general idea of the text in your mind. And it is strongly suggested that you read the book, *The Little Prince*, as soon as possible; it is a short lovely novel that probably has been read by most of you already.
