Assignment 1 Sense of Place through Motion	Students will gain control over the aperture and shutter speed settings in order to visually express the mood of a place (indoor or outdoor) through either blurred or frozen motion. <b>Assignment 2</b> Composition, It's a Jungle Out There	Students will explore symmetrical, asymmetrical and center weighted compositions, line, colour and balance while seeking to fill the frame with a variety of urban elements to visually communicate the metaphor of "jungle". <b>Assignment 3</b> Mid-term test, in-class	Students will write an in-class test (on paper). Short answer and multiple choice questions based on technical information presented including manual mode, DSLR camera controls, exposure, blur, freeze, depth of field, composition, and elements of design. <b>Assignment 4</b> Open Choice Series	Students will learn to present a visual story in a "beginning, middle, end" type of format on a theme of their own choice. See rubric for full details.	August 2nd, start of class	20%
