Course Objectives:	Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be familiar with the rudiments of Digital photography and will have developed the technical skills necessary to produce quality photographic images. In addition, the student will have some understanding of the expressive potential of the photographic medium.
Required Textbooks of Readings:	Your camera user manual.

EQUIPMENT REQUIREMENT

Each student must provide **their own** interchangeable lens digital camera with the ability to use RAW file format and Manual mode (M). If possible, two lenses, one wide-angle (18mm to 55mm) and one telephoto (55mm to 250mm).

You must have access to Adobe Photoshop.

Optional: tripod, camera trigger.





There are many models that have the equivalent of this Canon starter kit. Having only one wide-angle (18mm to 55mm) or telephoto (55mm to 250mm) lens will limit your ability to capture specific types of photographs.
