CALENDAR DESCRIPTION

Art 241H(3-3) *Drawing I*

Basic theory and practice of drawing, involving mainly still life and figure projects in monochromatic media.

[No prerequisites]

COURSE OBJECTIVES AND CRITERIA OF EVALUATION

For the most part, course content has been devised so as to help students attain proficiency with regard to:

- **1. Realisation of Objects**: Persuasive realisation of observed / constructed three-dimensional objects, appropriately foreshortened and (where applicable) appropriately lit.
- **2. Evocation of Space**: Persuasive evocation of observed / constructed three-dimensional space according to the principles of perspective, with consistent observation / construction of the fall of light, where appropriate.
- **3. Handling of Materials**: The ideal to be aimed at is crisp, clean and fresh.
- **4. Composition**: Effective organization of form and content within the containing rectangle of the pictorial format.
- However, NB, a few projects have been devised for the sake of acknowledging alternative possibilities and to clarify, by contrast, the main thrust of course content. Alternative criteria apply to those projects, as detailed in the notes on the projects concerned.

COURSE ACTIVITIES, CLASS STRUCTURE AND OUT-OF-CLASS WORK

The course is project-based.

Some projects are allocated a single class for their completion; rather more will require both Monday and Wednesday classes, some even longer. On due dates, classes will begin with presentation of work from the project concerned. Unless otherwise advised, a drawing with your name clearly written on it should be pinned to the wall by 9:00 am. Failure to present work for review on time - or failure to present substantially complete work - will result in the reduction of your grade by 0.3 grade points when you do eventually submit the completed work (e.g., a work graded 4.0 (A) will be reduced to 3.7 (A-) and so on). However, if a late submission results from illness or acceptable compassionate reason and you provide a signed explanation in writing on the back of the work, consideration will be given to this and your grade may be reduced by a lesser amount or not at all. A doctor's certificate is NOT required and you do have to specify the nature of the medical condition.

Work on the day's project will begin at 9:35 am on "due dates;" 9:30 am on other class days. Throughout the class, the instructor will be available to assist students with their work on the current project, or to critique work from the previous class. At the end of the class, work from the previous class (that you have pinned on the wall) will be collected in for grading. Your drawing, with grade and comments, will normally be returned within a week.

As far as possible, projects are arranged so only those extending over the weekend will involve a significant amount of out-of-class work, though each student will have to find time to read the notes for the next project between Monday and Wednesday classes. Six hours of out-of-class work each week should be anticipated, including time for reading notes.

COURSE CONTENT

Course content is outlined in the attached "Schedule of Classes" and fully described in the separate booklet of "Project Descriptions."

ASSESSMENT AND GRADING

There is NO final examination for this course. Grades are based on term work.

A. Mid-term grade (50% of final grade):

-based on first six projects. All six projects must be completed. However, provided all six projects have been completed, only the five best grades will averaged. If all six projects have not been completed, your grade will be pro-rated accordingly (e.g. if only five projects have been completed, your grade will be reduced to five-sixths the average grade for the five projects).

B. End-of-term (50% of final grade):

-based on last six projects. All six projects must be completed. However, provided all six projects have been completed, only the five best grades will averaged. If all six projects have not been completed, your grade will be pro-rated accordingly (e.g. if only five projects have been completed, your grade will be reduced to five-sixths the average grade for the five projects).

Each project will be assessed on the extent to which the work produced fulfils objectives 1, 2, 3 and 4 listed above (or alternative objectives stated in the notes on the project concerned). Please see appended "Grading Scale."

N.B. Drawings submitted after the due date.

Late drawings responding to any project will be accepted for grading until the Friday of the last week of classes (until Friday, December 7); however, unless each late drawing is accompanied by a valid written excuse, 0.3 grade points will be deducted from the grade awarded for each drawing. If you are unable to complete all projects by the final due date and have a valid medical or compassionate reason, you may request a formal extension for approval by the Dean of Arts.

ATTENDANCE

- Students are expected to attend all classes. Each student is responsible for making him/herself aware of all assignments, procedures and announced due dates. Absences do not excuse a student from this responsibility.
- Each student will be expected to be in class with the appropriate materials, ready to draw, at the prescribed starting time. In addition, each student will be expected to attend and actively participate in all critique sessions scheduled for class time.
- If you are obliged to miss one or more classes due to illness or for some other reason, you should consult with the instructor immediately on your return. He will do what he can to help you make up for lost time and cover material missed.

MATERIALS AND EQUIPMENT REQUIRED (APPROXIMATE COST \$75)

- 1.Drawing Boards:
- -Plywood, slightly in excess of 26"x 20" to fit Mayfair paper.
- -[Masonite, 48"x 32", to be borrowed from instructor.]
- 2.Cardboard portfolio(s): The 24" x 33" portfolio has the double advantage that it will accommodate the regular size of Mayfair paper comfortably and will fit in your locker, but it will not accommodate the larger size of Mayfair paper without folding (i.e. ruining). If you wish to buy your own large cardboard portfolio (30" x 43") you may keep it in the instructors' office **AT YOUR OWN RISK**; alternatively, you may leave the one large drawing we will be doing this semester in the large portfolio I will set aside for the use of this section, once again **AT YOUR OWN RISK**.
- 3. White Mayfair paper 26"x 20". As required, white Mayfair paper 40"x 60" (to be used folded in half).
- 4.HB and 6B pencils (optional mechanical pencil), stick charcoal, block charcoal and black and white conté crayon.
- 5.An eraser. My preference is for the pink sort that slopes to a sharp angle at each end.
- 6. A long ruler (not less than 30").
- 7.A pocket calculator.
- 8. Scissors
- 9. Such other materials as may be required for particular projects.

LOCKERS

The Art Building lockers are administered by the Students' Union in MacEwan Student Centre 251. There are various shapes and sizes of lockers for rent. Therefore, please write down a range of barcode numbers (top left of each locker) for the locker shape that you require, and bring this list with you to the SU office, MSC 251 between 8:30 and 16:30 M-F. In the absence of the instructor from class, students should make reasonable efforts to continue working on projects provided their work is demonstrably non-hazardous. If there is any doubt about the safety of work to be undertaken while the instructor is absent, students should consult the Head Technician or his representative before continuing to work.
