# **Course Description**

Drawing II

Continuation of Art 241, introducing colour media

## **Prerequisite**

Art 241

Calendar Description of Art 241 for information:

Basic theory and practice of drawing, involving mainly still life and figure projects in monochromatic media.

## **Objectives of the Course**

For the most part, course content has been devised so as to help students attain proficiency with regard to:

- 1. Realisation of Objects: Persuasive realisation of observed / constructed three-dimensional objects, appropriately foreshortened and (where applicable) appropriately lit and appropriately coloured.
- 2. Evocation of Space: Persuasive evocation of observed/constructed three-dimensional space according to the principles of perspective, with consistent observation /construction of the fall of light, where appropriate.
- **3.** Handling of Materials: The ideal to be aimed at is crisp, clean and fresh.

**4. Composition**: Effective organization of form and content within the containing rectangle of the pictorial format.

However, NB, A few projects have been devised for the sake of acknowledging alternative possibilities and to clarify, by contrast, the main thrust of course content. Alternative criteria apply to those projects, as detailed in the notes on the projects concerned.

# **Textbooks and Readings**

Book of "Project Descriptions" prepared by instructor. Distributed in second week of classes at no cost to students.

# **Assignments and Evaluation**

The course is project-based: six (6) projects in the first half of the semester; six (6) in the second half. **All projects are weighted equally**. However, if all six projects in the first or second half of the semester have been completed, only the best five grades will be averaged in computing the mid-term grade or the end-of-term grade. Should all six projects not be completed, projects not completed will be awarded a grade of 0 (F) and all six grades will be averaged to determine the mid-term or the end of term grade.

The final grade for the course will be the average of mid-term and end-of-term grades.

Project 5: Warped grid figure drawing in oil pastels.

Project 6: Oblique view through the window at night.
