Course Description

Visual Research Methods introduces students to the practice of creative research through the use of photography. Students conceptualize, research, plan and initiate in-depth photographic projects that explore questions about social life and culture.

Prerequisites &/or Co-requisites

No prerequisites.

Course Outcomes

Students enrolled in Visual Research Methods will tackle a series of challenges fundamental to producing meaningful and engaging photographic projects. Upon successful completion of the course students will be able to

- Formulate an interesting and compelling project idea
- Conceptualize the parameters of a doable project
- Build a knowledge-base through relevant research
- Identify an appropriate visual, photographic approach for exploration and presentation
- Develop a plan of action for producing the project
- Write a cogent, focused proposal for creative research

Once a project plan has been developed, students will do preliminary photographic work to pre-test and make any necessary adjustments to the project plan as envisioned.

At the conclusion of the course students will have produced a viable, written project proposal and an initial series of photographic images. For students who choose to continue, work on the proposed project will be fully implemented in ART 465, Selected Topics in Studio Research: Advanced Visual Research, offered in Winter 2016.

Textbooks and Readings

Readings in support of project work will be assigned.

Assignments and Evaluation

All assignments must be submitted on time and in electronic format. File formats and all other submission details for each assignment will be specified in class.

Evaluative criteria for each graded assignment will be clearly outlined when the assignment is given.

Students must submit all class assignments in order to pass the course as a whole. There is no Registrar-Scheduled Final Exam.

Writing

Proposal writing is a major component of this course. Students will receive in-class feedback on their proposal ideas and students are welcome to meet with the professor during office hours to discuss ideas and review early drafts. The quality of writing will be considered in the grading of written assignments. Students' writing must be clear, focused, grammatical and free of spelling errors. Note: It is the student's responsibility to keep a copy of or any relevant documentation regarding each submitted assignment.

Late Assignment Policy

Assignments will be graded down by one-third of a letter grade each day they are late.

Additional Information

Art 336 or equivalent is recommended.

Students must have a digital SLR camera in order to complete course assignments. Students will need to store image files: an external hard drive or other storage solution is recommended for archiving/backing up work completed during the term.

Course Activities

In addition to lectures, course activities include oral presentations and critiques of student work. Producing a successful project proposal will require extensive fieldwork—time devoted to exploring potential shooting sites, getting to know the environment, making contacts with potential photographic subjects, establishing rapport with people and building their trust. Be prepared to spend the time necessary to produce a clearly conceptualized project proposal with a solid foundation so that you can successfully carry out the ideas you have proposed.
