Course description:	<p>Topics related to contemporary studio and curatorial practices such as spirituality, exhibitions, digital storytelling, new media, or public art. This course may be repeated for credit.</p> <p>This course explores the techniques, structures, and possibilities of storytelling in which the reader / viewer can make decisions which impact the story itself. The course focuses on interactive storytelling as implemented in digital platforms such as video games, the internet, interactive fiction and film, and augmented / virtual reality. We will also discuss some examples of interactive storytelling in non-digital media. Students will learn concepts relevant to interactive storytelling, consider examples in a variety of genres, and complete assignments leading to the generation of an interactive story using tools appropriate for beginners.</p>

Course Objectives:	<p>By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Students will gain an understanding of interactive storytelling as a unique artistic form. 2. Understand the affordances of digital vs traditional media for interactive storytelling, including how storytelling changes with the addition of interactivity. 3. Students will understand basic principles and considerations of interactive fiction and use them to analyze interactive fiction works. 4. Create and implement their own interactive stories using accessible tools.
Required Textbooks or Readings:	<p>There is no textbook that students need to purchase. We will refer to several readings and videos (both conceptual and specific works of interactive storytelling) throughout the course, some of which will be chosen by students. All will be shared with students via D2L / course blog and will be accessible via the University of Calgary library online access or available freely on the internet. If students wish to do some reading to prepare for the course, many will be drawn from Miller, Carolyn Handler. <i>Digital Storytelling a Creator's Guide to Interactive Entertainment</i>. 2014. Web.
