Course Description

Theories of art, critical methodologies, and aesthetics in the visual arts.

Objectives of the Course

Upon successful completion of this course the student will have:

- 1. developed skills and confidence in critical thinking and awareness of a range of art theoretical positions and critical methodologies;
- 2. developed skills in analyzing significant texts from areas including art theory, aesthetics, psychoanalysis, and social theory;
- 3. produced written work that communicates well argued positions based on course materials;
- 4. developed an awareness of his or her situated relationship between praxis and knowledge.

Reading Journal (main points, questions & summary) (30%; 10 entries, graded equally) Students are required to keep a written journal for each assigned reading. Each journal entry will include:

- 1. clear identification of the author's thesis and two of the author's main supporting points;
- 2. two questions (e.g., for clarification, extensions of author's thinking) or two specific topics of interest (e.g., relations to other readings, relation to art practice ...) for group discussion. Be sure to indicate the exact section (e.g., page number, section, paragraph number) in the text that your questions or topics emerge from;
- 3. a brief summary (about 250 words) of what you have learned from the reading.

These journals will be handed in each week (NB. possibly uploaded in the weekly drop box on the D2L on-line course management system - TBA).

Evaluation: Each journal assignment will be graded out of a total of 3 points.

A grade of 3 indicates all three required elements were satisfactorily completed.

A grade of 2 indicates that only two of the required elements were satisfactorily completed.

A grade of 1 indicates that only one of the required elements was satisfactorily completed.

A grade of zero indicates that the journal entry was not completed, or was submitted late. No other partial grades will be given.

Quizzes (20%; graded equally)

There will be four short (15 minute) in-class quizzes on the readings during the semester. Unless otherwise indicated, the quizzes will cover material from the prior two reading assignments & related class discussions. There will be five short answer questions worth 1 point each. No partial marks will be given.

The quizzes will be peer-graded in class and then given to the TA for review. Note: All electronic devices and other reference materials must be put away during the quizzes.

Case Study Presentations (15%)

The presentation of a case study of an artist (of the student's choice) is in the form of a *pecha kucha* (see http://pechakucha.org) which consists of 20 slides timed for exactly 20 seconds each for a total of 6m40s. The presentation is to be scripted and reflect the work of the chosen artist and its relationships to at least one theoretical approach discussed in the course. A copy of the written presentation script is to be handed in at the beginning of the class in which you present.

Presentation dates will be randomly assigned by the instructor. Students are required to present on their assigned day. If there is a known medical or other serious circumstance with the assigned day, it is the student's responsibility to make alternate arrangements with the instructor as soon as possible. A medical note or other appropriate documentation is required if the student is unexpectedly unable to present on their day. See Late Assignment Policy.

Presentations will be graded on:

- 1. clarity and effectiveness of presentation of the chosen artist's work;
- 2. clarity and strength of theoretical connection(s) to artist's work;
- 3. and the visual quality of the presentation and adherence to pecha kucha format.

Final Essays (35%)

A final essay of 1,200 words maximum (~ 5 double spaced pages) is required and must incorporate relevant material from the assigned readings. Students will be able to choose one of two possible essay topics (provided when essay is assigned). Proper citations of all sources used (quoted or paraphrased) is required. Please use MLA style of citations.

Peer-review of your essay is required. Two weeks after the assignment is introduced, students will bring their PRINTED draft essays (must be a minimum of 80% complete i.e., 4 pages) to class. With the help of a review form supplied by the instructor, each student will peer-review another student's essay and have their own essay reviewed. This review form must be attached to the final essay on the due date.

Evaluation is based on:

- 1. an introduction that includes a clear thesis statement and states your main supporting ideas;
- 2. well developed support for each main idea with clear reference to relevant course readings;
- 3. a clear conclusion and final statement;
- 4. adherence to the assigned topic:
- 4. clear writing style and absence of grammatical and other writing errors;
- 5. proper citations for support material used (Please refer to the section on plagiarism).

Essays are required to be printed AND submitted electronically. No late submissions are accepted except under documented circumstances of an exceptional nature. Please refer to the Late Assignment Policy outlined in this document.

Submit your essay printed double sided or on re-cycled paper already used on one side. (Please ensure your text is legible and be sure to draw a line across the re-cycled side!)
